November

- Mountains become cold and snowy
- Fall color peaks in Valley
- Irrigation releases into Cache Creek are eliminated and the creek becomes fordable until heavy rains occur
- Waterfalls on Table Mountain start flowing again after the first good rain
- <u>Ladybugs</u> converge in Deer Creek Canyon (Rocky Pool and Bigleaf Pool hikes) to overwinter. You may see them when the weather is nice
- Migratory waterfowl back at Gray Lodge. The birds congregate at the Gray Lodge refuge now and disperse after heavy rains flood the rice fields
- Best November hikes:
 - <u>Hat Creek Rim</u> -- some fall color peaking around Nov 1, often fresh snow on the surrounding peaks
 - o <u>Rocky Creek</u> -- a little fall color peaking in mid Nov, creek ford likely low
 - Yana Trail -- moderate fall color 2nd and 3rd weeks of Nov
 - <u>T-Ford</u> -- some fall color usually peaking last week of Nov
 - o Gray Lodge -- peak birds in Nov

December

- Coldest month
- Shortest days
- Best December hikes:
 - <u>High Bridge Hill</u> -- usually grass is greening the hills, and the creek still crossable before the winter rains
 - Yahi Trail -- the ford is often impassable in winter so early Dec may be last chance for a while
 - Inks Creek Point -- sunset from the bluff overlooking the river beside a campfire is recommended. Sunsets come early in Dec

January

- Second coldest month
- Wettest month
- Waterfalls are flowing well
- Best January hikes:
 - <u>Phantom Falls</u> -- lots of waterfalls
 - <u>Old Homestead</u> -- visits one waterfall which runs a day or two after heavy rain. Green and lush
 - o <u>Many Waterfalls</u> -- very many waterfalls, especially for a day or two after heavy rain
 - Inks Creek Point -- open sunny hike, place for campfire and watch the sun set, view of Lassen Peak

February

- Wildflower season starts
- Second wettest month. Waterfalls continue to flow well
- Best February hikes:
 - <u>Yana Trail</u> -- nice climate in Feb, beautiful walk through green grasslands in canyon along Sacramento River
 - <u>Old Homestead</u> -- visits one waterfall which runs a day or two after heavy rain. Green and lush. A few wildflowers by late Feb
 - <u>Many Waterfalls</u> -- very many waterfalls, especially for a day or two after heavy rain.
 Some wildflowers by late Feb

March

- In late March wildflowers reliably peak at <u>Table Mountain</u> and <u>Upper Bidwell Park</u>
- Best March hikes:
 - o <u>Annie Bidwell</u> -- outstanding wildflowers, no creek crossing for this hike
 - Paynes Creek Point -- some wildflowers, views of snowy mountains
 - o Indian Creek Hill -- a good time for this hike
 - <u>Phantom Falls</u> -- outstanding wildflowers. Parking lot may be full in late Mar-early Apr, especially on weekend afternoons.
 - <u>Many Waterfalls</u> -- outstanding wildflowers. Parking lot may be full in late Mar-early Apr, especially on weekend afternoons.
 - <u>Yana Trail</u> -- some wildflowers, perfect weather

April

- If rains kept ground moist throughout March, wildflowers will peak in early April at Table Mountain and Upper Bidwell Park. Superblooms may occur
- Peak <u>tick</u> season. They are most common in Feather River Canyon and Upper Park hikes. We have never found any ticks on any High Country hikes.
- Best April hikes:
 - <u>T-Ford</u> -- the creek ford at T more likely easy to cross than it has been for a while, great variety of wildflowers sometimes 70 species
 - <u>Rocky Creek</u> -- creek may be low, green, some flowers
 - <u>Chips Creek</u> -- perfect weather, snow on the mountain, green in the canyon

May

- Darmera bloom up out of the creek Deer Creek Canyon hikes: <u>Rocky Pool</u>, <u>Bigleaf Pool</u>
- Butterflies peak in foothill hikes especially when about 80F
- Flower season peak moves up to the higher foothills
- High Country season starts when snow has melted at <u>Jonesville Canyon</u>. In 2020, Jonesville went to zero snow when <u>Humbug Snow Pillow</u> was measuring 9-inches Snow Water Content. This usually occurs sometime in May.
- Best May hikes:
 - <u>Rocky Pool</u> -- peak wildflowers, butterflies on warm days
 - Chips Creek -- butterflies, cool water

- Pauls Creek Point -- peak wildflowers, good weather
- o <u>T-Ford</u> -- past peak wildflowers, creek crossing likely easy
- <u>Hat Creek Rim</u> -- peak wildflowers last week of May

June

- Hot in the Valley & Foothills, still snow melting in the High Country
- Longest days, high UV index
- <u>Humboldt Lilies</u> bloom in early June upper Yahi Trail and Old Homestead hikes
- Best June hikes:
 - Mount Linn -- snow melts earlier here than in the Cascade Range
 - o Jonesville Canyon -- lowest elevation of the High Country hikes. Flowers peaking
 - <u>Cub-Butt Divide</u> -- often some snow patches until late June. Good wildflowers

July

- Snow likely melted from all but the highest elevation hikes
- Hottest month
- PCT thru hikers passing though our area
- In early July wildflowers peak in High Country
- Mosquitos peak in High Country
- Best July hikes:
 - o <u>Mount Linn</u> -- great hike. Relatively mosquito-free.
 - <u>Brokeoff Mountain</u> -- peak wildflowers. Best just after the snow has all melted (about mid July). Relatively mosquito-free.
 - <u>Mount Eddy</u> -- a little crowded but many outstanding campsites
 - <u>Shasta View</u> -- grand view of Mount Shasta from campsites
 - o <u>Toad Lake</u> -- fairly large lake, with spring water source

August

- <u>Perceids</u> meteor shower
- Second hottest month
- Wildflower season ends by September
- Best Aug hikes:
 - o <u>Mount Linn</u> -- West Knob or Mount Linn summit campsites perfect for meteor shower
 - o <u>Mount Eddy</u> -- a little crowded but many outstanding campsites
 - o Shasta View -- grand view of Mount Shasta from campsites
 - <u>Toad Lake</u> -- fairly large lake, with spring water source

September

- UV intensity much reduced from June Solstice, good time for higher peaks
- Most of snow melted off Lassen Peak
- Mosquito season is past
- Weather starts to cool
- Sunset opposite <u>full moon</u> on <u>Lassen Peak</u>
- Best September hikes:
 - <u>Mount Eddy</u> -- a little crowded but many outstanding campsites

- <u>Shasta View</u> -- grand view of Mount Shasta from campsites
- o <u>Toad Lake</u> -- fairly large lake, with spring water source
- o <u>Grassy Swale</u> -- Kings Creek is finally low enough for easy crossing on this excellent hike
- o Lassen Peak -- outstanding for hike up for sunset, can hike down in moonlight
- <u>Magee Lake</u> -- outstanding after an early fall rainstorm has passed through

October

- Fall color peaks in High Country
- First dustings of snow likely
- Late October or early November the High Country snows-in for the winter. Check amount of snow at the <u>Humbug Weather Station</u> and the <u>Lower Lassen Peak Weather Station</u>
- Best October hikes:
 - Jonesville Canyon -- Black Cottonwoods yellow fall color. Aspens, Mountain Dogwood, Bigleaf Maple and Black Oak in color along the drive. Best the middle two weeks of October
 - o <u>Chips Creek</u> -- Bigleaf Maple bight yellow fall color. Best the last two weeks of October
 - <u>Cub-Butt Divide</u> -- good for sunset hike, view of Lassen Peak
